

# Frenchy D'Amour

Fred Wah, South Slocan, British Columbia

I grew up in Trail, British Columbia, home of the Smoke Eaters. These world-famous ice hockey champions gave the people from Trail an inside track on fame. As did Frenchy D'Amour who was the second legendary person I met. (The first was Larry Kwan, the China Clipper, who played with the Smokies, later with Calgary and then down east somewhere.)

My dad was a very gregarious restaurateur who, with my granddad, ran the Elite (pronounced ee-light) Café downtown. As a Chinaman he had learned early to kowtow to the rich and powerful. He'd often sit the health inspector down to a free lunch in the kitchen of the café, or spike the mayor's coffee with rum at Christmas time. The local constabulary could frequently be found rifling down sugar doughnuts and coffee by the back door. My dad knew everyone who was anyone in this smelter town.

This particular Sunday afternoon in the spring of 1948 the whole town was buzzing about Frenchy D' Amour's triumphant return. There was even a parade down Cedar Avenue. But what most impressed me was that my father had invited Frenchy over to our house for a drink, and now here they were, sitting at the dining-room table, talking about the victory. I watched them drink. Or, rather, I watched Frenchy drink; my father had that Oriental disposition that prevented him from drinking very much. He'd pour, with a great deal of challenge and bravado, huge straight shots for his guests, yet rarely touch it himself. For a long time I thought he did it just to make asses of the high muk-a-muks. But when I saw him pouring drinks and chumming it up with Frenchy, I was really proud to see my dad joking around with the most famous person in Canada that day, in our house.

You have to understand that 1948 was the greatest year in the history of human civilization. Besides the huge floods along the Columbia and the Kootenay that spring, Frenchy D' Amour's rink lifted the Brier Tankard and brought the Dominion Curling Championship not only home to Trail but, for the first time in history, to British Columbia.
